Preface

Generation Y

To Generation Y belong all people born between 1977 and 1998 – according to sociologists about 75 million individuals. They are supposed to be realistic, even optimistic. Generation Y has grown up with the internet and digital globalisation. Generation Y members are multitaskers. They celebrate diversity. While Generation Y has high expectations, it is the first generation after a long period of time that will probably not achieve the same standard of living their parents had, at least in many parts of the world. Generation Y members are doctors for the previous generations – many of them female. We dedicate the 30th MWIA Conference 2016 to them.

The World Conference will be about our challenges in the future as doctors and as women in challenging contexts. In particular, women’s lives are determined by relationships – cross-generational as well as intra-generational. Generation Y follows Generation X and the Baby Boomers. 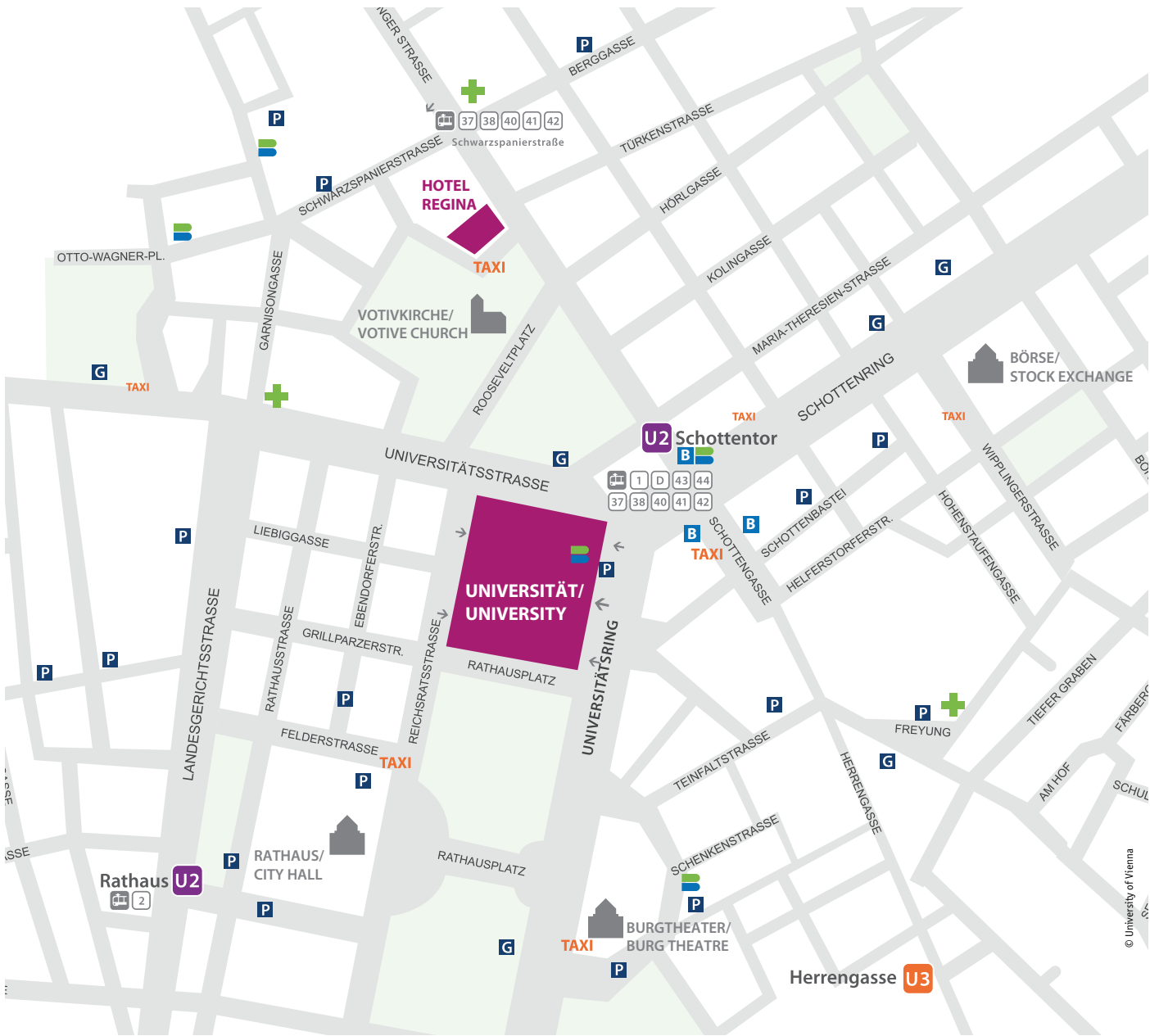

GENERAL INFORMATION

BANK & ATM

Banks are open Monday to Thursday from 9:00 am to 12:30 pm and from 1:30 pm to 6:00 pm, and Friday from 9:00 am to 12:30 pm and from 1:30 pm to 3:00 pm. ATM service is typically available 24 hours. You can make cash withdrawals from Bankomat ATMs in Austria at any time of day or night using Austrian or foreign Maestro cards. Other cards are also accepted, including Austrian and foreign MasterCard, American Express, Visa and Diners Club credit cards, as well as Cirrus and Visa Plus cash cards. Please note that charges may apply for withdrawing cash; the charges vary from bank to bank.

CURRENCY

Austria is a member of the European Union and has adopted the euro (€). Currency can be exchanged at most banks and at the airport by displaying your passport.

CUSTOMS REGULATIONS AND RESTRICTIONS

Information on restrictions on the import of goods into Austria from European and non-European countries can be found on the Federal Ministry of Finance website.

CREDIT CARDS

All major credit cards are accepted at the majority of hotels, shops and restaurants in Vienna. To find out whether your credit card is accepted, please check the logos on display at the entrance to the premises before attempting to make a payment.

DIALING CODES

The country code for Austria is +43 and the area code for Vienna is (0)1.

PUBLIC TRANSPORT

Vienna has a well-developed public transport network. The five underground lines, several trains, busses or trams will take you almost anywhere in the city.

Opening times

The underground trains (U-Bahn) run from about 5:00 am in the morning to about midnight. On Friday night, Saturday night and on nights before holidays the un-

derground lines operate 24 hours a day. From mid-night until 5:00 am the trains run every 15 minutes. You can find detailed information in the schedules: <http://www.wienerlinien.at/eportal3/ep/tab.do?tabId=0>

Tickets

Tickets are available at ticket machines and at most underground stations or at points of advance sale. Single Ticket
Valid on all public transport services in the core zone Vienna; valid for one trip in one direction; you are allowed to change lines but the journey may not be interrupted.

Short-Term Passes

valid on all public transport services in Vienna; tickets for 24, 48 or 72 hours; valid from the stated date and time

Price 24 hours ticket: 7.60€

Price 48 hours ticket: 13.30€

Price 72 hours ticket: 16.50€

Vienna weekly ticket

Valid on all public transport services in Vienna; valid from midnight on Monday until 9.00 am the following Monday.

Price: 16.20€

Night lines

From Sunday to Thursday from midnight to 5:00 am there is no regular underground service. But you can use night lines (night busses). Night lines only operate between 0.30 am and 5 am.

ELECTRICITY

The standard electricity supply is 220 volt (50HZ). Plugs and sockets conform to the European norm. Plugs are two-pronged.

HOW TO GET TO THE CONFERENCE VENUE FROM THE UNDERGROUND STATION SCHOTTENTOR – UNIVERSITÄT?

Please proceed to the escalators with exit sign „Universität“. Go left, then right to the next escalators with the exit sign „Universität“. Go straight (about 83 meters) until you reach the stairs in front of the main entrance of the University of Vienna.

UNIVERSITY OF VIENNA

The University of Vienna celebrated its 650th Anniversary in 2015. It is the oldest university in the German-speaking world and one of the oldest universities in Europe.

With 175 degree programmes, 40 university continuing education and training programmes and about 94,000 students, the University of Vienna is the largest and most diverse educational institution in Austria.

TIPPING

Tipping is common in Austria, mainly in restaurants and for taxi drivers. It is customary to tip between five and ten percent.

WEATHER

In July and August, there are some hot and humid days. Vienna has warm summers with average high temperatures of 24 to 33 °C (75 to 91 °F), with maximum exceeding 38 °C (100 °F) and lows of around 17 °C (63 °F), but it can be unpredictable, so you should bring an umbrella and warm clothes.

The Castalia Fountain in the Arkadenhof of the University of Vienna:

In the middle of the Arkadenhof (arcaded courtyard) in the main building, in the center of the University of Vienna's memorial topography, Castalia sits enthroned.

In Greek mythology, she is the guardian of the fountain of knowledge in Delphi. This fountain statue, erected around 1900, symbolizes the wisdom of the men whose monuments surround her in the Arkadenhof – the first and only monument for a woman was unveiled later, in 1925. In historical context, however, her meaning is much more diverse: She stood for a male-dominated civil society that discriminates against women, protesting against the ruling system. Her relevance as a symbol for a misogynistic university was especially long-lived. In 2009, finally, this level of meaning was broken by the inclusion of the Castalia fountain into Iris Andraschek's art project "Der Muse reicht's" ("The muse has had enough.").

TRAVEL INFORMATION

Travelling from the airport to the University of Vienna: The airport Wien Schwechat is about 20 km away from the University of Vienna, which can easily be reached by train (S-Bahn), CAT (City Airport Train), Airport Bus Shuttle or taxi. A taxi would be the most comfortable solution and costs about 35€.

Furthermore, Pre-Paid-Taxis are available as well. Airport Drivers and various other taxi enterprises offer the possibility to book your airport transfer online, via E-Mail or by phone. The costs start at 33€, depending on the services required.

THE SUBURBAN RAILWAY (S-BAHN)

Take line S7 from the airport to Wien Mitte/Landstraße (duration: 25 min.; price: 4,40€ one way).

At stop Wien Mitte/Landstrasse, change to underground U4 (green line), direction Heiligenstadt. At stop Schottenring change to underground U2 (purple line), direction Karlsplatz. Get off at stop Schottentor-Universität. (duration: 9 min.; price: 2.20 € one way). You can buy the ticket (for two zones!) at the ticket machine in the train station incl. public transport in Vienna).

CITY AIRPORT TRAIN (CAT)

The CAT takes you to the City Air Terminal (Wien-Mitte/Landstrasse, undergrounds U3 and U4) in 16

minutes. CATs leave the airport every half hour. The first CAT runs at 6:09 am and the last one leaves the airport at 11:39 pm. From the City Air Terminal (Wien Mitte/Landstraße) the route begins at 5:36 am and ends at 11:06 pm.

AIRPORT BUS SHUTTLE

There are regular buses from the airport to Wien Morzinplatz/Schwedenplatz (with connection to undergrounds U1 and U4), Wien Dörfelstrasse/Meidling (with connection to underground U6), Wien Westbahnhof (with connection to undergrounds U3 and U6).

The bus station is directly in front of the airport arrival hall. Buses leave every 20 to 30 minutes. It takes around 30 minutes to get to Vienna. Tickets (8€ one way) can be bought on the bus or from the ticket machine. Tickets are only valid for the shuttle bus, not for public transport in Vienna!

Participants who want to go directly to the conference venue from the airport are advised to take the airport bus to Wien Morzinplatz/Schwedenplatz. Then take tram 1, direction Stefan-Fadinger-Platz, and get off at stop Schottentor.

Medical Women's International Association

The Medical Women's International Association (MWIA) was founded in New York City by Dr. Esther Pohl Lovejoy and her colleagues from around the world in 1919. The first international congress of MWIA was held in New York City in 1922 and since then, MWIA has continued to hold congresses every three years. The themes are chosen regarding topics that are relevant to the times.

The Medical Women's International Association is an international non-governmental organization (NGO). Members are from national associations of women physicians and individual members from all five continents. Embodied in its mission is the objective to raise the health status of the communities in which the members work, especially the health and development of women and children in those communities. Membership in MWIA allows medical women the opportunity to meet and confer upon questions concerning the health and well-being of humanity; to promote the general interest of medical women by developing cooperation, friendship and understanding without regard to race, religion or political views; to overcome gender-related differences in health and healthcare between women and men, girls and boys throughout the world; and to overcome gender-related inequalities in the medical profession.

MWIA is divided into eight geographical regions, each with a Vice President. In addition to the international congresses, each triennium all eight regions hold a regional congress.

Since the early 2000's, MWIA has been known for its work on gender and health. Following the initial training manual for gender mainstreaming, there soon followed a training manual on adolescent sexuality and now, in 2016, MWIA will launch its training module on domestic and sexual violence at the Vienna Congress.

MWIA is in official relations with the World Health Organization, has Category II Status with the Economic and Social Council of the United Nations, and belongs to the UN Department of Public Information. MWIA has a member on the board of the Council for International Organizations of Medicine (CIOMS), has its Austrian member, Dr. Edith Schratzberger sitting as the newly elected President of the European Women's Lobby, and enjoys observer status at the World Medical Association.

Austrian Medical Women's Association

Already founded in the year 1919, the Austrian Medical Women's Association has been campaigning for female colleagues for nearly 100 years, building bridges between society and medicine and concerning itself with whatever affects the "Woman in Medicine" – also including the topic Gender Medicine.

The annual congresses are a meeting place, an opportunity to network amongst each other and to exchange experiences as well as a chance to get to know each other, intensify contacts and to learn from each other.

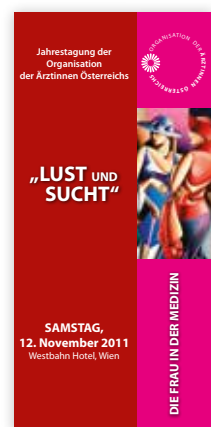
Every annual conference has a main topic – "Lust and Addiction", "Fear and Power", "Beauty and Shame", "Justice", "Failure and Success" – to only mention a few. Speakers, who apart from medicine come from various scientific fields, such as philosophy, sociology, psychology or journalism, broaden the view by ethical and social aspects, which are often neglected in everyday routine. Issue-specific workshops round off the programme of the conferences.

A major concern is the promotion of young colleagues. In the course of the annual congress, we award the Lore Antoine Prize for a top publication and a dissertation/diploma thesis in the field of Gender Medicine. This award includes prize money of 1.500 EUR.

In cooperation with the Austrian Society of Gender-Specific Medicine, we offer our members support in the participation in the University programme "Gender Medicine".

Furthermore, we support social projects, such as the school project Loubila and the training of nurses or midwives in Africa.

After 1931 and 1968, the Austrian Medical Women's Association is hosting the world congress, taking place every three years, in Vienna for the third time. Our main focus lies on concerning ourselves with the challenges of the future and we dedicated the congress title to the "Generation Y".
